Violence and despair are portrayed casually, with humor and irreverence, but the contrast between the gravity of the content of the panels and the levity in the way they are drawn creates a friction that underscores the societal*

*critique. It gets messy, and there are consequences. And yet, there is hope, resilience, caring, beauty, and art.
